MSRA Women and Men Shine in National Team Tourneys

The Howe Cup

The MSRA sent 25 women to the Howe Cup in Washington, DC last fall during the weekend of October 18–20. The Howe Cup is named after the Howe sisters of Philadelphia, the "first family of U.S. women's squash." The Howe Cup tournament was first played in 1955 as an inter-city competition among East Coast cities. Over the years, it has become a national competition, with both an inter-city tournament and, starting in 1973, an intercollegiate tournament.

The 2003 Howe Cup was presented by the National Capitol Squash Racquets Association, and matches were played at the Sports Club/LA in Georgetown and at Results/The Gym on Capitol Hill. One of the highlights of the weekend was the Friday night reception on the top floor at the

Hart Senate Office Building (famous for one of the anthrax scares), with its beautiful sunset view of the Capitol area. The Saturday dinner was held at the Sequoia restaurant, located aside the Potomac River with a lovely view of the river and the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

The Boston A team (and Howe Cup defending champs) consisted of **Hope Prockop**, Concord-Acton's assis-

tant pro Wendy Ansdell, SquashBuster's squash director and team captain Orla O'Doherty, Wellesley College squash coach Shona Kerr, and the MSRA's own Jeannie Blasberg. The A team played well in a round-robin format. When it came to the final day of competition, three teams—Boston, Philadelphia, and Southeast—each had a 3-1 record. Since Boston and Philadelphia had won 14 matches each (the first tie-breaker), the tournament referee had to go to a second tie-breaker (number of games). Philadelphia came out ahead, having won 50 games to Boston's 48 games. So the Boston team finished in second place, with captain O'Doherty going undefeated throughout the tournament.

The Boston B1team consisted of **Lorraine Sadkowski**, **Kate Lytle**, **Lindsey Bishop**, **Andrea McNeely**, and **Mary Beth Horn**, who served as team captain. The B1 team was undefeated in their draw, against strong teams from New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Washington. The champi
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onship match pitted the Boston B1 team against a strong team from Connecticut, with Boston coming out on top, 3 matches to 2. Lytle, McNeely, and Horn all finished the tournament with undefeated records. The Boston B2 team, **Kara Kardon**, **Wendy Irwin**, **Margo Grossberg**, **Liz Brecht** (captain), and **Naomi Bradshaw**, finished fourth out of fifth in their draw with a 1-3 record. Their one win came over a strong team from Southeast. Wendy Irwin, playing at number two, had the best record on the B2 team, winning two of her four matches.

The Boston C1 team was led by captain, number one player, and Howe Cup organizer extraordinaire **Dominique Farinaux-Dumas**. Other players on the Boston C1 team included **Catherine Kniker**, **Jennifer Moran**, **Bernadette Dixon**, and **Kimberly Song**. The C1 team finished second in their draw with a 2-1 record. On the final afternoon of the tournament, they trounced the Mid-Atlantic

team in the 3rd/4th place playoff, 4 matches to 1. Concord-Acton's Jennifer Moran, playing at number three, was undefeated throughout the Cup. The Boston C2 team was ably captained by Maria Mayorga, who also played at the number one position. Her teammates included Jane Wiseman, Sarah Lemaire, Vicki Vento, and Azi Rahbar. The C2 team won only two individual matches in their draw, but in the 7/8 playoff match against New York's C2 team, they won 2 matches to New York's 3 matches, 8 games to New York's 9. Jane Wiseman finished with the best record of the Boston C2 players, winning two of her four matches.

The Howe Cup players would like to thank the NCSRA for running such a terrific tournament, the MSRA for their financial support, and Wilson for providing team t-shirts.

2002 USSRA 5-Man Team Championships

During my four years here in the US, the National 5-Man Teams is an event that I have never competed in, either due to coaching commitments or to injury. Naturally, I was excited to have the opportunity to captain and play on a Boston team comprising of a squad of six talented players: Lucky Odeh, Rohan Bhappu, Briggs Johnson, Ian Conway and Mike Semprucci. This annual event, like the women's Howe Cup, brings together squash teams assembled in playing merit order, from all over the country, to compete in a knockout format. Trinity College in Hartford, CT, home of 2002 men's and women's national collegiate champions, hosted the event over the weekend of December 13–15.

Our first-round match saw us matched with a talented although beatable Harvard I team. We were scheduled to play on Trinity's two brand-new exhibition courts constructed of state-of-the-art tinted glass

walls. This allows a larger number of people to spectate and makes a great setting for a squash match. One of the down sides is, for the players, it can take a fair degree of adjusting to. Not only are you playing with an all-white squash ball, the walls are blue and semitransparent. There was no time for our team to practice on the courts earlier in the day, and this was reflected in a disappointing 5-0 loss to Harvard I. Every player had chances to win games from 7-7 or 8-8 situations, but only **Briggs Johnson** managed to extend his opponent to four games.

Friday night's loss dropped us to the 9–16 consolation group and brought us up against Brunswick, last year's B Flight winners. The rigors of my match against Dylan Patterson of Harvard brought about worrying back pain the following morning, forcing my withdrawal from the event. Relegated to the sidelines, I was able observe the proceedings and coach the team.

Our team's confidence was quickly restored with a comfortable 5-0 win over Brunswick. The best match featured **Lucky Odeh** against nationally ranked Under 19 #2, Parker Sutton. Sutton showed a lot of flair and determination and surprised Lucky by narrowly taking the first game. However, the next three games saw Lucky regain his composure, and he came through strongly to take the match in four games.

The Boston team was now in the last four of our section, so we were guaranteed at least 12th place. Looking at the strength of the remaining teams, our team felt confident that we could go all the way through to take 9th place. The match against Brunswick hadn't sapped too much energy; in fact, it brought valuable practice, and everyone was feeling sharp.

The Junior Wallbangers were our next opponents, a team made up of talented nationally ranked juniors from around the US. Ian Conway's match could have gone either way against a very fit opponent, who eventually edged him out in four very tight games. Another comfortable win was recorded with substitute T&R's Mike Semprucci playing particularly well in the fifth spot. Our fourth and final match would decide between 9th and 10th place vs. N.California. Our team were still feeling confident despite the 9 a.m. Sunday match time! Again, we scored a comfortable 4-1 win, and a satisfactory ninth place was secured.

The Boston team was left to reflect on what might have been after our first-round match, where we didn't play to our full potential. Next year our chances look promising, with the arrival at The Sports Club/LA of New Zealand National Champion, **Daniel Sharplin**, and the return of **Mark Lewis**. Mark was unable to commit due to the expected arrival of his first child literally on the first day of the tournament. Congratulations to Mark on becoming a first-time dad!

All in all, the event was a great experience as well as great fun and saw a team represent Boston for the first time in several years.

USSRA Level II Coaching Clinic

The USSRA is conducting a Level II coaching clinic in Massachusetts at the Noble and Greenough School in Dedham this year. This is a great opportunity for Massachusetts coaches to improve their skills with nationally known coaches Bill McNally and Mark Allen.

This clinic will cover coaching intermediate to advanced tournament-level players in individual and group sessions. Sport science, oncourt drilling, match analysis, off-court training, and planning are some of the exciting areas to be covered.

MSRA \$10 Dues Increase

The upcoming year will bring some changes at the USSRA, our parent body. As a result, USSRA dues, paid by the MSRA on members' behalf, will increase to \$35. (Currently, \$25 of your \$45 annual MSRA membership is paid to the USSRA.) As a result, the MSRA dues will increase by \$10 to cover this increase. This change will take effect when you renew your MSRA membership in July, 2003. The increased dues are envisioned to finance better systems at the USSRA and data accessibility on the web site, as well as increased funding for elite athlete programs at a national level.

The following chart shows how the \$25 that the MSRA sends to the USSRA is spent:

General Operating Expenses	44%
Squash Magazine	40 %
Insurance	12%
Utilities and Maintenance	4%

General Operating Expenses include salaries, postage, phone, supplies, computer hardware, and professional fees. Insurance expenses include health, building, and general liability. Utilities and Maintenance expenses include gas, trash removal, electric, and water. The remaining expenses cover the cost of producing Squash Magazine and mailing it to MSRA/USSRA members.

2002 Dartmouth Fall Foliage Junior Open

MSRA juniors turned in stellar performances at the Dartmouth Fall Foliage tournament, traditionally the early fall season's toughest junior event. This year's edition, held on the gorgeous weekend of October 5–6, inaugurated the newly expanded squash facility at Dartmouth College, with 10 beautiful international courts. Once again, Dartmouth coach John Power's marquee event drew juniors from throughout the United States—Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, New Hampshire, Connecticut, New York, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Cincinnati—and Canada.

MSRA juniors passed this early season test with flying colors, winning five of the nine divisions contested: Boys Under 13, Boys Under 15, Boys Under 17, Mixed Under 11 and Girls Under 13. There was one runner-up finish by an MSRA junior, five 3rd place showings, two 5th places and four 6th place awards.

2002 Baird S. Haney Open Brooklyn, NY

The Baird E. Haney Junior Open, hosted by The Heights Casino Club in Brooklyn, New York, is one of the oldest and most prestigious junior squash tournaments in the United States. It attracts the best juniors from all around the country. This year's edition was an especially important stop on the junior tour, having been designated a "National Team Selection Event" by the USSRA. This designation means the top six players in each division have the inside track to be invited to USA Junior National Team programs and events.

Although the MSRA contingent at the Baird E. Haney was relatively small this year, its success rate was phenomenal. Unfortunately, former National Squad invitees **Chessin Gertler** (Boys Under 17), **Becca Loucks** (Girls Under 17) and **Cece Cortes** (Girls Under 15) were absent due to injuries, so the MSRA was represented by only six juniors. Amazingly, four of the six MSRA players placed in the top six of their age divisions, giving them the leg up on National Squad invitations. These talented players were **Jon Barry** (Boys Under 17), **Casey Cortes** (Girls Under 13), **Mark Froot** (Boys Under 15) and **Spencer Kurn** (Boys Under 17).

Mark Froot turned in the best MSRA performance for the weekend. Mark was crowned champion of the Boys Under 15 division after marching through the draw without the loss of a game. Coming in as the co-third seed, Mark dispatched the top seed **Travis Judson** of Greenwich, CT in three games in the semifinals. Then he defeated the tough second seed **Todd Ruth** of Gladwyne, PA in the tournament finals, 9-7, 9-5, 10-8.

Casey Cortes, playing in her first year in the Girls Under 13, placed fifth in this tournament. Casey lost to top seed and eventual champion Katie Ballaine of Brooklyn, NY in the quarterfinals, but she marched through the feed-in consolation draw with the loss of only one game. Casey defeated Katie Giovinazzo of Staten Island, NY in the fifth and sixth place playoff, 9-7, 9-6, 9-5.

Jon Barry and Spencer Kurn finished in fifth and sixth place, respectively, in the tough Boys Under 17 division. These two players have already played tough tournament matches against each other this season, with Spencer defeating Jon in the finals of the Newport Junior Open and Jon beating Spencer in the Dartmouth Fall Foliage quarterfinals. Ironically, these two players met again early in the main draw of the Baird E. Haney, with Jon winning the match and sending Spencer to the feed-in consolation draw. Jon was, in turn, moved to the feed-in draw by virtue of a quarterfinal loss to the top seed Francis Johnson of Charlottesville, VA. Jon and Spencer met yet again in the fifth and sixth place playoff, after some notable wins in the feed-in draw. Jon defeated the co-fifth seed Drew Blacker of Summit, NJ, and Spencer defeated the other co-fifth seed Mark Rapisarda of Brooklyn, NY along the way. In the end, Jon prevailed over Spencer for the fifth place spot, 6-9, 9-3, 9-3, 9-2.

Congratulations to these MSRA juniors!

2002 MSRA Grand Prix

The first MSRA Grand Prix junior squash tournament was held over the weekend of November 8–10, 2002 on the six international courts of the Noble & Greenough School in Dedham. Tournament directors **Gary and Barbara Rubin** were pleased with 67 entries for this new (and late addition) to the junior squash calendar and are looking forward to even greater participation next year. Under the double consolation draw format developed by the Massachusetts Junior Open and followed in all MSRA-managed junior tournaments, lots of competitive play is guaranteed for all. Every competitor is guaranteed at least three matches, with a full feed-in consolation for all non-round robin draws. Tournament sponsor Black Knight provided long-sleeved shirts to every competitor, sporting a "Born to Boast" logo. Out-of-town competitors and their families enjoyed the accommodations at the Dedham Hilton, and everyone feasted on ample food throughout the three days of play.

The Girls Under 13 draw featured this season's third meeting, and for the second time in a tournament's finals, between **Alli Rubin** and **Sarah Loucks**. The two met in Newport and in Bowdoin; in a tough struggle, Loucks beat Rubin in four games, with two games decided by 10-9 scores. Placing third was **Corey Schafer**, edging out **Margaret Fulham**.

In the Girls Under 15 round robin, **Krissy Rubin** from Boston took first, followed by **Cecilia Haig** in second place.

The Girls Under 17 finals featured a battle between two Milton Academy teammates, with **Julia Rosenthal** topping **Samantha Bendetson**. Third place went to **Cece Cortes**, with a win over fourth place **Rebecca Perlman**.

Julian Kirby from Dover won the mixed Under 11 round robin, besting runner-up Toby Koekkoek in the finals. Coming in third place while playing in her first tournament was Dori Rahbar from Newton, with a win over Laura Russell. Elliot Green just edged out Cameron Rahbar for fifth place, and, in a real battle for sixth place, Michael Lillie topped James Fulham. One match that was a highlight of the entire tournament was the five-game, 45-minute first-round battle between Michael Lillie and Cameron Rahbar, with Rahbar finally winning. It was a delight seeing the hustle and tenacity of both young players. The level of play and the ability to cover the court, which is huge for players 10 and younger, was simply impressive among all of the Under 11 competitors and bodes very well for the future of Massachusetts squash.

First place in the Boys Under 13 draw went to **Barrett Takesian** with a win over **Amory Bennett**. **Will Sullivan** took third with a win over **Sam Haig**, with **Tyler Kopp** edging out **Julian Kirb**y in the consolation finals to take fifth place overall.

James Hogan won the Boys Under 15, beating Johnny Russell in the finals. On his way to the finals, Hogan had wins over Andy Macalaster, the eventual fourth-place finisher, and Chris Vernick. Russell beat third-place finisher Ben Bainbridge from Hartford, CT in the semi-finals. Winning the consolation finals and taking fifth place was Sam Landis with a 3-1 win over Daniel Lesser. Winning the Boys Under 15 classic plate was Amory Bennet, with a win over Will Kantrowitz.

In a strong field, **John Lingos-Webb** from Milton won the Boys Under 17 in a hard-fought final over **Elliot Beck** from Andover. Lingos-Webb, after falling behind in each game, showed great poise while slowly and patiently battling back. Lingos-Webb beat fourth place finisher **Greg Kantrowitz** and **Dan Pasquale** to reach the finals; Beck beat third-place finisher **John McCarthy** and **Rob Linsalata**. Pasquale, after falling

to Lingos-Webb in the second round, went on to place fifth with a 3-1 win in the consolation final over **Jon Simpson**.

In a small but strong field, **John Barry** won the Boys Under 19 round robin without losing a game. **Alex Hogan** from Brooklyn, NY placed second, and **Anthony Bardaro** of the Belmont Hill School placed third. Pasquale's fifth-place finish demonstrates the importance, to the junior players, of the full feed-in consolation. Without the full feed-in format, Pasquale, with his second-round loss to eventual winner Lingos-Webb, would not have had the opportunity to play in the consolation bracket and would have had an early exit from the tournament. Similarly, the Massachusetts Plate (or second consolation bracket) allows junior players who have two early losses to continue to enjoy tournament play with additional matches.

MSRA Junior Leagues

A record 16 teams are participating in this season's MSRA Junior League. Each team has up five players of varying abilities, from varsity-level high schoolers to intermediate-level younger players, during six Sundays between November and February. All matches will be held on the 16 courts of Harvard University's Barnaby Squash Courts at Murr Center. The Junior League dates are November 3, November 24, December 15, January 19, February 2, and February 23. Each league date, teams and players will play two matches apiece. The culmination of the Junior League is the Knockout Cup, the MSRA junior team championships, to be held on April 6. Immediately after the conclusion of Knockout Cup, the MSRA Junior Committee holds its annual junior awards ceremony and season closing gala.

Thanks to League Coordinator Gaurav Juneja, League Manager Sarah Cortes, area squash professionals and coaches, a large number of new players will enter the MSRA scene through the Junior League. Chris Spahr and the University Club lead the pack with six teams competing. John Ambielli and the Belmont Hill School are fielding three teams. Orla O'Doherty's SquashBusters crew have entered three teams. Sharon Bradey of the Harvard Club is bringing two teams. Paul Ansdell's Concord-Acton Squash Club and Frank Millet's two-time defending Knockout Cup Champion Milton Academy Boys have each entered a team.

I. IMPORTANT RANKING INFORMATION

USSRA in-season rankings reflect players who

- 1. Are current USSRA members.
- 2. Are certified USSRA Club Level Referees.
- Have competed in the SAME age division in at least two tournaments.

Note: Year-end rankings require at least four events in the same age division. Missing? If you do not appear in these rankings, it may be because

- Tournaments in which you competed have not yet submitted results.
- 2. Your USSRA membership has expired.
- 3. Your local SRA has not yet forwarded your membership to the USSRA.
- 4. You have not yet passed the Club Referee Exam.
- 5. The USSRA does not have your correct date of birth.
- 6. Divisions were combined and the draw did not indicate your proper age division.

II. APPEALS: April 15, 2003-May 15, 2003.

All rankings are computer generated and not open to appeal until April 15, 2003. Appeals received before April 15 will be discarded. Questions about ranking order are not handled until the appeal period.

III. CLUB REFEREE CERTIFICATION

To appear in any in-season rankings, juniors must first pass the Club Referee Examination. To secure a year-end ranking, juniors must have passed the Club Referee Exam by March 31, 2003. Once passed, juniors do not need to be re-certified. The Club Referee Exam must be mailed to the USSRA.

2002 USSRA Junior Closed National Championships: To qualify for Nationals, all juniors must have played in two tournaments in the same division as the age division entered for Nationals. Both tournaments must be played on or before the weekend ending February 02, 2003. National entrants will be selected from the top 32 ranked applicants based on the February 5–15 in-season rankings. Entrants must also be current members and have passed the Club Referee Exam. Consult the 2002–2003 Junior Advisor for more information on USSRA rankings and events.

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Scottish Junior Open Rocks the World

Casey Cortes plays GU13 squash in Massachusetts. She was seeded 5th and finished 11th in the Scottish Junior Open and 26th out of 36 in the British Junior open. Her sister Cece, who plays GU15, finished 5th in the Scottish Junior Open and 17th out of 36 in the British Junior Open. Cece and Casey are currently ranked #17 and #18 respectively in the European World rankings.

I have to admit that there were some down sides to playing in the Scottish Junior Open. We flew six hours from the US to the UK, staying overnight at an airport hotel (which actually wasn't that bad). We had to get used to British time, which is five hours ahead of us, making it really hard to get up in the morning, and British food is unusual. But when you compare that to the good things, you'll see it was all worth it. Our family stayed at the Balmoral, a really nice hotel in Edinburgh. The food there was really good (especially for Scotland), and the hotel alone was worth it. Cece and I stayed with Richard and Pat Millman's team from the USA, at the tournament hotel, The Jury's Inn. It was not as fancy, but it was $\underline{\boldsymbol{\omega}}$ much fun. Almost all the players from the Scottish Junior Open stayed there, so it was like a really big party that went on 24 hours a day for a week. We stayed up really late, playing cards or just talking with the other kids. We didn't watch TV a lot because it was Scottish, and there is nothing good on TV in Scotland. But maybe it was just our hotel.

There were over 220 players in the tournament from 31 countries, so I got a lot of competitive matches against people I have never played before. The tournament venue was pretty OK. There were only eight courts, but they were pretty nice. There was one exhibition court. It was blue, and the front wall was glass so you could watch from the front. They served lunch there everyday, but watch out for the food. The seedings were a little messed up. In the GU13, Emily Park was seeded 3/4, but she won the whole thing. Dipika Pallikal from India came in second even though she was completely unseeded. Claire Gray, seeded #1, lost all her matches yet finished 8th because she had a bye. England's unseeded Lottie Fulton won third place. In the GU17, #1 seed Kirsty Craig finished 9th. I was seeded 5th but finished 11th out of 16. I played Lottie Fulton in the first round, and they have no feed-in consolation.

Cece and I were so happy to get to go with the Millmans' group, thanks to our coach **Chris Spahr**. He knew them a long time ago in Connecticut. **Richard and Pat Millman** were really nice. They organized a lot of activities that were really fun, like matches with juniors from private squash clubs and lunch afterwards in the clubs. We saw a lot of Edinburgh, which is a really cool city. For culture, we went to the Edinburgh Dungeons. The Edinburgh Dungeons is a museum that shows all the tortures and diseases from medieval Edinburgh. It was cool. There were also people who dressed up like people from medieval times and they told us stuff about medieval Edinburgh, but they sort of acted it out instead of it being like a history lesson, like how they put rats on a cage on your chest and they chew you to death. The rats probably like that better than regular Scottish food. And there was a lot more. We also saw the Edinburgh Castle that was built in 1024 by Robert the Bruce and the

video game exhibit with more than 100 video games that you could play. In the same museum, there were some of the Lewis chess pieces.

The British Junior Open Rocks Too

There were so many famous squash players just hanging around playing, like **Simon Parke** and **Nick Matthew**. We also got to have drinks and shoot pool in the club pub with the Nottingham kids. I was so sad when the trip was really over. Cody Cortes bought a T-shirt that says "Nottingham Squash" from **Richard O'Connor** and he wore it to school the next day where we were when we woke up.

Overall, there were more good things than bad. I hope that I can return next year and play in the Scottish Junior Open. It was definitely one of the most fun tournaments of the season.

In the first match, **Elizabeth Ricker** from Exeter beat **Stefanie Marx** from Greenwich 9-2, 9-4, putting Exeter up 2-0. New program trains MSRA junior elites for national and international competition

The Massachusetts Junior Squads is a new elite junior development program modeled on the USSRA national squads. In this elite

program, participation is by invitation only to highly ranked juniors, based on each junior's national ranking. **Chris Spahr**, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Squads and a team of local coaches and professionals aims to

Massachusetts Squads and a team of local coaches and professionals aims to bring Massachusetts elite juniors up to the standard of juniors elsewhere in the USA.

The Massachusetts Junior Squads held two training sessions for its 35 members in November and December, with the goal of getting them ready for upcoming major junior tournaments. Coach **Chris Spahr** of The University Club has recruited the best of area pros and coaches to raise the juniors' level of play, including the following coaches: **John Ambielli** of Belmont Hill School, **Paul Ansdell** of the Concord-Acton Squash Club, **Ian Conway** of Milton Academy, **Gaurav Juneja** of Harvard University, **Briggs Johnson** of the Harvard Club and **Daniel Sharplin**, newly arrived at The Sports Club/LA.

The first major tournament in December was the USSRA Junior Olympics, held at Yale University over December 19–22. 400 entrants from around the world participated in this tournament. Coach Spahr and **Jason Hicks** (also of the University Club) accompanied the largest Massachusetts junior contingent to date to the Junior Olympics—17 players, resplendent in their Massachusetts Squads team shirts. The Mass. Squads juniors posted some strong results, with some of the juniors playing their best squash of the year.

Next up were the Scottish and British Junior Opens, held the weekends of

Next up were the Scottish and British Junior Opens, held the weekends of December 27–29 and January 2–6, respectively. Three Massachusetts Squads members played the British, the oldest, largest and most prestigious junior tournament in the world. Two Mass. Squads members played the traditional warm-up to the British, the Scottish Junior Open. All three played their best squash ever, with one junior achieving 5th place in the Scottish Junior Open and 17th in the British Junior Open.

Finally, the Massachusetts Junior Open ("MJO"), held January 10–12 at Harvard University's Murr Center, showcased Mass. Squads talent to more than 100 out-of-town players. Like last year, this year's MJO drew 225-plus kids and is poised to be one of the three largest junior tournaments in the USA, after the USSRA Junior Olympics and the National Closed Tournament. The Massachusetts Squad troops had a tremendous showing at the MJO in spite of the appearance of some of the highest ranked juniors in the USA. The Massachusetts Squad scored 1st place champions in three divisions, 2nd place in two divisions, 3rd place in three divisions, one 4th place finish, two 5th place showings and three 6th place efforts.

The Harvard Club and MIT are tied for 5th. MIT has a powerful 1-2-3 punch of Irfan Chaudhary, Kunal Surana, and Ali Merchant. The Harvard Club is riding the shoulders of talented newcomer Briggs Johnson and the resurgent Josh Horwitz. T&R stole all the good players from Maugus and are tied with the Union Boat Club for the second spot in the standings. UBC, by the way, has trotted out Mark Lewis for a key match or two, though he is unlikely to play enough matches to qualify for the playoffs.

The University Club is oozing in squash talent this year. So much so that they have split themselves into two teams roughly by age. Not surprisingly, the older team (creatively named University Club 1) is dominating play. Jason Hicks, Chris Spahr, Sal Llach, Scott Poirier, and Doug Lifford make up an imposing group. It was only a couple of years (and pounds) ago that Lifford was winning the State A tournament and now he can barely make the traveling squad. The University Club 1 team sits atop the standings. The younger team (creatively dubbed University 2) is led by newcomer Rohan Bhappu, who in my unofficial rankings, rates just behind Lucky Odeh, last year's state champion. University Club 2 is positioned in the #4 spot in the standings.

Speaking of state champions, all the winners since 1996, except for Pat Malloy, are playing in the league this year, including Lucky Odeh, Rob Davis, Ali Merchant (a two-time winner), Doug Lifford, and Ron Rubin. What fascinates me is that in last week's play, three of these past champs played #4 on their teams and one played #2. Even last year's state A runner-up, Chris Spahr, is playing in the #2 or #3 slot. You'd think these guys would get a little more respect. Only Lucky plays #1 on his team.

The overall quality of play in the league continues to rise. Lucky remains undefeated and #1. Two newcomers have cracked the top ten: Rohan Bhappu at #2 and Briggs Johnson at #5. Irfan Chaudhary slips in at #3 and Jason Hicks at #4. Mike Semprucci has inched up to #6, which shows what rooming with Lucky can do for your game. Kunal Surana (#9) is another player who has made huge strides in his game. Long-time A-leaguers Paul Ansdell and Tyler Hindermann make up the #7 and #8 spots. Tyler, by the way, entered the season as the all-time A-

league wins leader with over 100 league wins under his belt. Rounding out the top 10 is **Preston Amos** and on the outside looking in at #11 is **Scott Poirier**, back in action after a year in London. Don't forget to sign up for the State A tournament on the MSRA web site today!

2002 Senior Doubles Fall Foliage Classic

The fourth edition of this event, initiated in 1999 by Lee Spelke, was hosted by the University Club over the weekend of October 18–20. The pounding took its toll as they finished third overall. Tony Jerauld played well in his initial tournament, as did Hank Shaw teaming this time with Dave Murphy. There was no question, however, that the Heckscher-Vleck tandem was the class of the field as they dropped only one game over the course of three matches.

The 55+ division was a round-robin group of five teams, including the internationally ranked pair of **Cass Quinn** (Toronto) and **Dick Rice** (Rochester). They were expected to be challenged by **Fran Donlan** and **Jim Young** (Harvard Club), but as often happens in doubles, what looks good on paper has little relation to reality. Quinn and Rice took that match in three but received their own shutout at the hands of national and world champions **Tom Poor and Lenny Bernheimer**, who in turn went on to win the event for the second year.

The matches were hospitably supplemented by a courtside cocktail party (for spouses and guests) Friday evening, lunch in the dining room Saturday, and a brunch on Sunday morning. In addition to Lee's work, **Chris Spahr** provided expert assistance in creating the draws and refereeing. The attendance from many locales testifies to the quality of this tournament, which continues to expand and is another event in the excellent tradition of doubles at the University Club.
